It has been my honor to serve as JAGA's president this year and I look for a bright future for the organization.

It's also my duty to report on the year, so here goes:

- A goal in recent years has been to identify and nurture a strong "bench" to provide strong leadership; that goal has been met with the election of Randy Nader as president and strong, experienced people in the other places on the Executive Committee.
- We also want to continue making JAGA an active organization, one that will continue to reach out to the community. Our attendance at board meetings has been excellent, indicating that club directors see value to spending their time and money on meetings.
- The board approved several initiatives a few years back, realizing that they would take time to implement them. Two were of long-term importance: being able to acquire the BlueGolf tournament management system and hiring a part-time Administrative Assistant. Thanks to a generous donation from one of our directors, who wishes to remain anonymous, we have BlueGolf up and running. We also budgeted an Administrative Assistant and identified an excellent candidate in Kevin Glynn, who began in April.
- Our Scholarship Trust continues to provide funding for students, and the leadership of Bob Streightiff and Ken Hicks has continued its success. Adair Roberts again ran the Scholarship Trust tournament and again produced a record return, this time over \$22,000. Donations are always accepted and our website has a link on the home page. Go to jaxareagolf.org.
- As you know, JAGA members are not individuals. Our base is local golf clubs, who pay \$175 annually to support golf in Northeast Florida. If your club isn't a member, then we need to talk.
- Jeff Adams and his Tournament crew did a great job, expanding the schedule and having five events which were oversubscribed. The entire schedule was played on many of the area's best courses.
- We again worked with two other organizations to produce outstanding tournaments and our thanks to Jack Aschenbach, who runs the local junior foundation, and Sheila Brocki and Tama Caldabaugh, who head the First Coast Women's. For the first time, JAGA reserved spots in the Match Play qualifier and the Jacksonville Amateur for NFJG Tour champions.
- We continued to build a strong relationship with the Northern Chapter of the North Florida PGA. This relationship establishes a strong bond that will lead to advancing golf in Northeast Florida, consistent with our vision and message.
- The Celebration of Golf banquet was again a sellout at the World Golf Village and it will continue to rotate around the community. It's at San Jose this year and chairman Michael McKenny has lined up a terrific program.
- Communications are a major part of any organization; JAGA is no different. Jeff Adams took on the responsibility of getting out the message and what a job he did! The coverage in area media was extensive.
- The monthly e-newsletter called News & Notes, spearheaded by Fred Seely, also got out the word about JAGA and its member clubs. If you don't get the email, please sign up on our website. Go to jaxareagolf.org and link to Subscribe to JAGA Email. Lots of good information.
- Randy and his Executive Committee will be missing a key person next year as our Executive secretary, Barney Poston, is stepping aside after more than a decade of handling the association's administrative duties. Barney will continue to attend meetings as a representative from Hidden Hills and I'm sure he'll be available to help in any way.
- Let me close by again thanking everyone who has helped this year. JAGA again has made a great move forward and the best is yet to come.

Nimnicht to be honored at banquet

Anne Nimnicht will become the fifth recipient of the Deane Beman Award at the annual Celebration of Golf banquet on Feb. 19 at San Jose.

Tickets are \$65 and available at jaxareagolf.org.

Nimnicht was the first female chair of the Players and is the only person ever to chair an event on the PGA Tour's three main tours: the PGA Tour, the PGA Tour Champions and the Web.Com Tour. In addition to the 1997 Players, she chaired the Liberty Mutual Legends of Golf at the World Golf Village and the Winn-Dixie Open at TPC Valley.

This year's speaker is Jacksonville's Len Mattiace, a PGA

Tour veteran who is now on the Champions Tour. The banquet also will feature an exhibition by Dennis Walters, who overcame disability to become a trick shot artist.

Walters will perform on San Jose's first tee during the reception which precedes the 7 p.m. dinner.

The award is named for former PGA Tour Commissioner Deane Beman, who led the Tour when it moved to Ponte Vedra Beach. He also was the first recipient of the award. Three others have received the Beman Award: Gate Companies owner Herb Peyton, philanthropist John Hayt and former First Tee CEO Joe Barrow.

The banquet is co-sponsored by JAGA and the Northern Chapter of the North Florida PGA.

Scholarship Trust

JAGA'S Scholarship Trust program dates back almost 50 years and over 350 students have attended college with the association's assistance. Over \$1,750,000 has been granted over that timeframe.

There currently are 25 students receiving \$1,000 per semester (\$2,000 per year.) Funds come from club and individual donations. The trustees manage approximately \$725,000 at present.

Applicants must be associated with a JAGA member club, either as members or employees. Information is at the JAGA website and all applications must go through a member club's director. The deadline is March 31.

Bob Streightiff of Queen's Harbour chairs the Scholarship Trust. Trustees are Steve Booma, Plantation; Michael McKenny, Timuquana; Allen Witham, Hidden Hills; Bunky Johnson, Mayport; Wayne St. Clair, Jacksonville G&CC, and Ken Hicks, Deerwood.

Ken Hicks also is the Scholarship Committee chairman.

Annual JAGA Awards

The 2017 JAGA award winners are featured in a photograph on page 1. These are the 2018 winners, who will be formally recognized Feb. 19 at the annual banquet at San Jose:

Director of the Year: Duke Butler III, TPC Sawgrass

Duke founded and chaired the Family Championship and assisted with the Billy Maxwell Four-Ball, and has been a strong supporter of association activities.

Professional of the Year: Ray Barr, Jacksonville G&CC

Ray hosted the Men's Amateur for two straight years, taking it again when the club originally scheduled in the rotation had to back out.

Club Executive of the Year: Greg Sheara, Timuquana

Greg's club hosted three major JAGA events in 2018 and will have the USGA Women's Four-Ball in 2019.

Community Service Award: Tom Dudley, USGA

A top rules official, Tom has worked numerous JAGA events. The Timuquana member receives national recognition this year as the winner of the USGA's Joseph C. Dey Award, which goes to the outstanding USGA volunteer.

Earl Kelly Service Award:

Jeff Willoughby, The First Tee

Jeff is a tireless promoter of The First Tee and reached out to every golf group in the area. He is active as a JAGA board member.

2018 JAGA Tournaments

Men's Amateur

Davis Roche of Jacksonville G&CC, a member of the Valdosta State team, won the rain-shortened Men's Amateur at his home club with a 5-under 139. David Anthony of Marsh Landing was second, two shots behind, and John Lobb of the host club finished third. It was the 57th annual event and drew a strong field of 78 players.

Women's Amateur

University of Florida player Lauren Waidner won the tournament on Timuquana's first extra hole, making a 15-foot birdie putt to beat Bolles student Chloe Schiavone and Jacksonville University's Hannah Berman. The three were close for the entire event with Schiavone leading after the first round with 70 and the other two at 71. Nicolette Donovan of the TPC was fourth and defending champion Ramya Meenakshisundaram of South Hampton was fifth.

First Coast Amateur

Purdue University player Cole Bradley held off a strong field to win the event at Hidden Hills by one shot. Bradley had a three-round total of 220 to edge Jonathan Keppler of Florida State and UNF's Jack Comstock. The event attracted a full field of 78 players and the tournament is now listed in the World Amateur rankings.

Underwood Cup

The Amateur team came back by winning eight of 12 singles matches over the Professionals on the second day to take the Underwood Cup, 13-11. It gives the Amateur teams a 13-11-3 overall record in the event played annually since 1992 at Timuquana.

Spring Four-Ball

Timuquana pro Jason Smith and club member Mike McGrath won in a card match with David Anthony of Marsh Landing and Duke Butler IV of TPC Sawgrass after they tied at 4-under 68 at Marsh Landing. Shari Zeimet of Queen's Harbour and Chris Hunt of Sawgrass won the Women's Division. Net flight winners were Jack Heinemann and Rick Jacobs of Eagle Harbor, and George Halvorsen and John Tancredi of the host club.

Men's Senior

John Lobb of Jacksonville G&CC won by nine shots at Eagle Harbor with a one-under 215. Tied for second were Ken Dye of Jacksonville Beach, Bill Hardaker of Timuquana and Michael Del Rocco of San Jose. Billy Clements of Eagle Harbor won Super Senior by two over David Hawkins of Windsor Parke. Brian Sachs of Gainesville took Grand Senior by two over Walt Martin of King & Bear. Net winners were Lee Fields, Bruce Moskovciak and Fred Crampton.

Family Championship

Tad and Patrick Griffin won the inaugural Family Championship with a 61 at the Slammer & Squire. That was two better than the teams of Dan-Ryan Dieterlie, Zach-Gary Lee and Scott-Kaitlyn Schroeder. Tournament organizer Duke Butler III and wife Sheila McLanaghan won the Couples division.

Match Play

Jacksonville University golfer David Wicks prevailed in the Match Play, edging Devin Suri of Sawgrass, 2 and 1, in the final at TPC Stadium. The losing semifinalists were Duke Butler IV of TPC Sawgrass and Matt Kleinrock of Jacksonville G&CC. In the qualifier at St. Johns G&CC, former champion Michael Smith led with 6-under 66 followed by Wicks.

Women's Senior

Tama Caldabaugh of Plantation won the Senior, played in conjunction with the Women's Amateur, by five shots with an even-par 144 at Timuquana. Therese Quinn of Sawgrass was second. Carol Williams of Plantation won Super Senior with B.J. Hayden next.

Boys

Peyton Billings of Magnolia Point took the boys title with a 5-under 139 at Eagle Harbor. The event was part of the North Florida Junior Golf Foundation Tour. Dragon Theam was next with 142 followed by Cody Carroll of Eagle Harbor and Campbell Kennedy of Magnolia Point. In other divisions, the winners were Lucas Slayden of the TPC and Cotton Suarez of Magnolia Point.

Girls

Lisa Colee of DeLand won the Girls Championship, also at Eagle Harbor and also part of the North Florida Junior Golf Foundation Tour. Camille Jacksonville of Keystone Heights was next followed by Reni Jancik and Elizabeth Kondal, both of St. Johns G&CC, and Rin Richardson of Savannah.

Billy Maxwell Fall Four-Ball

Chandler Gruenemeier and Chandler Altman won with a 9-under 63. The tournament honors the 1951 U.S. Amateur winner and former PGA Tour player Billy Maxwell, owner of the host club Hyde Park. There was a three-way tie for second at 67 between John Milton and Brad Rollinson, Len Schonfeld and Duke Butler IV, and Jay Davis and Zach Rogers. A second division went to George Halvorsen and Ray Cabano, both of Marsh Landing.

Scholarship Trust

Over \$22,000 was raised in the annual Scholarship Trust tournament at Ponte Vedra Inn and Club. There were 110 players and numerous sponsors, including primary sponsor Nader's Pest Raiders. In the scramble competition, gross winners were Jeff Dennis, Scott McCaleb, Matt Lucas and Tom Bynum. Net went to Dr. Tom Tomlin, Jeff Adams, Joe Stepnes and Fred Seely.

Club Team

The King & Bear team of Pro Jonathan Williams and amateurs David Garratt, Barnes Gray and Sal Randisi won with 17-under 127 in the best two ball net competition at Timuquana. There were 26 clubs represented and runners-up was the Marsh Creek team of pro Cary Splane, Vince Celestino, Alan Keary and Drake Batchelder. Tied for third were teams from Deercreek, Timuquana, Orange Park and TPC Valley.

Deane R. Beman

Deane R. Beman (born April 22, 1938) is an American professional golfer, golf administrator, and golf course architect.

Beman was born in Washington, D.C. and attended the University of Maryland, College Park, where he was a two-time All-American on the varsity golf team.

Following graduation, Beman had a career in the insurance field. During his golf career, Beman qualified for his first U.S. Open at age 17 in 1955. He qualified for the Masters Tournament 14 times. He won the U.S. Amateur twice and the British Amateur once. He also lost a playoff to Gary Cowan for the 1966 U.S. Amateur.

Beman turned professional in 1967 at age 29 and won four times on the PGA Tour between 1969 and 1973. Beman led for two rounds at the 1969 U.S. Open and finished one shot out of a playoff. He was a short hitter by top-class standards, with an outstanding short game, and was renowned as one of the best putters in the world. Injuries curtailed his playing career. He retired as a player and closed his business practice to become Commissioner because he believed he could contribute more to the sport as a commissioner than he ever could as a player.

Beman was the second commissioner of the PGA Tour, serving from 1974 to 1994. He introduced The Players Championship concept during this time, and developed the Tournament Players Club network of courses around the United States, along with Tour-branded clothing, expanding the Tour's financial clout. He converted the Tour into a 501-c6 organization, one of several moves that would transform the Tour's financial fortunes. He introduced pension plans for Tour players.

Under his watch, the Tour's board passed a policy requiring all tournaments to support a charitable initiative. Tour charitable contributions grew from less than \$1 million a year in 1974 to more than \$30 million in 1994. He is the architect of the Tour's successful television model, which still exists today.

He formed the Senior PGA Tour, now known as the Champions Tour, for players 50 and older in 1980 and the Ben Hogan Tour (now known as the Web.com Tour) as golf's developmental circuit in 1990. In 1983, the Tour expanded the number of exempt players from the top-60 on the season money list to the top-125.

At a February 28, 1994 meeting, the Tour's Board approved the capstone of his legacy, The Presidents Cup, an international competition. Later during that same meeting, Beman announced his plan to retire. It was the 20th anniversary of his appointment as Tour commissioner. From \$400,000 in assets in 1974, when Beman succeeded Dey, the Tour reported \$260 million in assets in 1994 when Beman resigned.

He was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2000 and was awarded the seventh PGA Tour Lifetime Achievement Award in 2007.

After stepping down as Commissioner in June 1994, Beman resumed his playing career, and competed in 69 Senior PGA Tour events through the 2005 Constellation Energy Classic. He co-designed Cannon Ridge Golf Club, which opened in 2003, with architect Bobby Weed. He still plays regularly, as he likes to say, "only once a day."
